This has been a very challenging year for VAL. We won new sector support contracts in the County and the City, but both contracts had further cuts in value that mean we have had to amend our services and lose experienced staff members through redundancy. We were also shocked and surprised that the European Social Fund and Big Lottery Fund did not award a third Building Better Opportunities programme to the partnership we had led that sought to create employment opportunities for people in rural areas.

At the end of the year, it was very disappointing to lose the Healthwatch Leicestershire contract by a very small margin to an organisation based in Staffordshire. As with most local voluntary organisations we continue to be buffeted by "austerity headwinds."

Even with these pressures VAL has continued to thrive. We have won a contract in Rutland to deliver information, advice and support to parents and young people with Special Educational Needs. Our staff have provided support to over 600 local organisations and recruited 1,000 new volunteers into community activity.

The two Building Better Opportunities partnerships that we lead are performing excellently, making a substantial difference to people's lives by giving them hope in the future. We have also increased our income from our building and increased the number of people using their personal budgets to buy support from the VALUES project.

VAL continues to help change people's lives for the better through its direct services, through its partnership projects with other local groups, and through supporting community and voluntary action.



## **Supporting Communities**

Part of VAL's core mission is to improve local communities by contributing to a thriving voluntary and community sector (VCS). Our Sector Support team does this by influencing decision makers, recruiting new volunteers and providing opportunities for groups to network, learn and grow.

### Violence Against Women and Girls

VAL supported Leicestershire's Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC) in their partnership bid to win a slice of a £17m Home Office fund to help prevent and address violence against women and girls.

As a result £600.000 has been awarded from the Violence Against Women and Girls service transformation fund secured by the Office of PCC. The project – supported by the city and county councils, Leicestershire Police, health and other agencies, including charities - aims to help victims by intervening earlier in smarter, more holistic ways. This will include emergency support for victims of domestic abuse and/or sexual violence (within 24 hours), outreach work and specific BME-focused providers.

VAL have facilitated the engagement of a large/ diverse range of VCS organisations in what was a very time limited bid. This quick and facilitated access enabled the inclusion of VCS focused elements in our bid to the Home Office which will undoubtedly have strengthened our overall bid.

### **Healthwatch Leicestershire**

It was a busy year for Healthwatch Leicestershire. We spent the year listening to local people, scrutinising local services and challenging stakeholders, with the aim of improving health and social care services for county residents.

### Fibromyalgia

Our 'It's not in my head' report was published in June 2017. The report highlighted the experiences of a particularly hidden group of people suffering in silence both locally and nationally.

Following the publication of the report we produced a jointly badged "Top 10 Tips for those living with Fibromyalgia' leaflet, with content provided by the Fibromyalgia Friends Together Group (FFTG). In order to raise awareness of the condition, University Hospitals of Leicester (UHL) agreed to circulate the leaflet to 28,000 people including UHL members and 12,000 professionals.

We also agreed to circulate the leaflet to GP practices across Leicestershire as a tool to help diagnose the condition and for patients to pick up for information.

As of 31 March 2018 VAL is no longer hosting Healthwatch Leicestershire – the new joint City and County Healthwatch will be delivered by Engaging Communities Staffordshire.

## **Supporting families**

SENDIASS Leicester is now also delivering a SEND-focused co-production and design service, supporting families to feed back about services delivered with Leicestershire Partnership Trust's NHS Healthy Together 0-19 programme.

In January 2018 SENDIASS Leicester was successful in the bid to deliver information, advice and support in Rutland.

### **SENDIASS** Leicester

L is a 16 year-old living in Leicester City with significant needs in the areas of social, emotional and mental health difficulties, communication and interaction, and cognition and learning.

Behaviour had been a long-term concern both at home and at school. The Local Authority refused an initial request for an Education Health and Care (EHC) needs assessment when L was 15. SENDIASS supported L's mum and discussed all available options.

As a result of this support the EHC needs assessment was agreed and SENDIASS helped L to look at her interests and aspirations. L was clear that she wanted to return to full-time education at a College of Further Education. L wanted to attend the Integrated Assessment Meeting (IAM) but asked for support at the meeting. SENDIASS Officer accompanied her and mum to the meeting, supporting her to comment on the Findings of Statutory Assessment and to present her views to the professionals present.

With support from both SENDIASS and Connexions L applied to a local College. She has now started her full-time course with the support outlined in her EHC Plan.

### The GREAT Project

The GREAT (Getting Ready for Employment and Training) Project helps members of families in Leicestershire who are not currently in work or training, to move towards work.

By the end of 2017, 12 people had moved into employment on exiting the project, representing 11% of participants who have signed up. A further 14 had moved into education which represents 13% of sign ups.

### **Helping families**

E is a single parent with a 10-year-old daughter. She has never worked but always did some volunteering. In the past she has experienced some mental health issues but had reached a point where she felt recovered and ready to look for a job. She was, however, under a lot of pressure as she had an upcoming court case regarding custody of her daughter, something she had been dreading for almost a year.

When E first came to the GREAT Project, her dream job was at one of her favourite retail shops. Shortly after E signed up to the project, the shop advertised vacancies.

The GREAT team brought her in quickly for a CV update, and E got an interview. Through her Employment Support Officers and GREAT Project partners, E accessed job-specific interview preparation and telephone and face-to-face support. Ultimately, she got the job.

E is thrilled to be working and feels that she has just gone through a major positive transition in her life.

I really enjoyed my experience with the GREAT Project and after being let down by other government bodies it was really nice to work with people that really cared about my future.

### Youth Employability Support (YES)

The YES Project supports young people aged 15-24 years old to take steps towards employment.

Its purpose is to help local young people to overcome challenges and barriers that have prevented them from finding a job or seeking further education.

These barriers could include issues such as:

- Low self-esteem and confidence
- Mental health issues
- Substance abuse
- Leaving care or in care
- Homelessness
- Previous offenders

The project team is made up of nine youth organisations and charities from across Leicester and Leicestershire. Working together as the YES Project means they can offer a range of courses, and support services tailored to individual needs.

### Lee's Story

Lee left school with low levels of literacy and numeracy which badly affected his confidence.

He first joined the YES Media programme where his self-belief blossomed. He then went on to complete a series of employability support programmes and work experience at Seed Creativity.

He applied for jobs and, after a flurry of interviews he secured a job at the Leicester trampoline park Flip Out. In December 2017, Lee was named winner of the YES Young Person of the Year Award.

This year 12 VALUES clients had an action-packed holiday in the Lake District with the Calvert Trust. Some of the clients had never been away from their family before so were keen to unpack and take ownership of their beds and drawers. Matt, who had never been away without his mum said, "This place is great, can we stay here forever."

On the first evening the group did fun team-building games in the sports hall on site and then headed out into the night for some orienteering in the dark. They were taught how to read maps and work together to find clues that were hidden round the site. The next day, they split into two groups. One group went cycling on three-wheeled accessible bikes and the other went for a lakeside hike. Tofiq said, "I'm definitely going to try and learn to ride a bike now."

On Sunday morning it was time to get out onto the water into some canoes. This was a new way to travel for everyone and was made even more exciting when they played water football and sped across the water in hotly contested races. Safely back on land and without anyone getting too wet, the groups then split into two again for more cycling and archery.

By Sunday evening the group was back on the bus home, still singing and laughing all the way. Even at 10 o'clock at night everyone was still in great spirits, having tried activities they'd never experienced before.

Last year I mentioned the 'looming' UK exit from the European Union – it seems that this year our departure is further away and there is the possibility of some extension to our European projects. On the other hand, the continuing uncertainty about future arrangements means the UK economy continues to splutter and as a result public services are still on a very tight financial rein. As you can see this has been a year of further uncertainty during which we have had to take some tough budget decisions as income for our contracts has dropped.

It is very difficult to plan ahead in the current climate but what we can do is to continue to deliver innovation and excellence, make the strongest case for continued investment in local voluntary action, and improve our connections to the community and to commissioners of services. Our top priorities this year will be to:

- Re-imagine our delivery of support to local communities and groups in the light of reduced budgets and changing needs
- Secure the contract to continue to provide the Leicester City SENDIASS service – and seek to extend our excellent support to other areas
- Exceed our targets in the Building Better Opportunities projects (YES and GREAT projects), secure positive outcomes for our users and successfully make the case for continued funding for our partnerships

I have to close by mentioning a few of our wonderful staff members. Very sadly Dave Woolman, who had led our IT Department, died just before Christmas. Not only did Dave contribute a huge amount to VAL's recent success but his children also volunteered for VAL for periods, gaining confidence and experience to further their careers. We were honoured to host a celebration of Dave's life for his family and friends after the funeral.

In addition, two of our long serving senior managers resigned their posts at VAL this year. Wendy Brickett left her role as Executive Manager for Children and Young People's services and Simon Jenner has recently resigned as Executive Manager for Infrastructure Support. VAL wishes them both every success in the future.
